I am very pleased to be able to report that there was a very good attendance at the Association's General Meeting held at Kemptville, Ontario, in Leslie Hall on Sunday the 4th February 1979. Over a hundred Association members were present. Seventy-two of the members were voting delegates.

The purpose of the meeting was to take an Association vote on the recommendations proposed by the O.S.A.R.D.A. Study Group.. The voting results are as follows:

The overwhelming favourable vote by member club delegates on each of the proposed recommendations has clearly indicated the direction your Association wishes to move. The natural follow-up is to ammend the Association's Constitution in accordance with the voting results.

Members of your Association's Executive have prepared the necessary motions which will be presented and voted on at the March 25th, 1979, Annual Meeting. Your club delegate's attendance and support is required at this meeting to ensure your decisions are implemented.

The Study Group participants can take great pride in their efforts over the past 16 months and are congratulated on their fine work on behalf of the Association.

The large turnout at the general meeting was a tremendous morale booster for your Association's Executive. I believe it demonstrates that the Association has grown both in stature and maturity and that the members do care about their Association and its affairs.

I personally wish to thank those that attended the meeting and voted on behalf of their respective clubs.

Once again, please remember to mark on your calendar the Annual Meeting, date of 25 March '79 and come to vote on the motions which will ammend your Constitution in accordance with the results of the general meeting.

If anyone was overlooked a year ago when they put their names down for a record at the 1977 Grey Cup Dance, we apologize for the omission and promise a speedy delivery of a record if they will telephone us.

Jamboree

I have heard, and read in John Thomson's letter in the November issue that, for the OSARDA Jamboree 1979, the callers have requested that they set up the program. This will be a giant step backwards from the excellent program set up by the OSARDA Executive for what could be called a "Dancers' Dance", unless the callers do the same. Based on programs for previous Jamborees, this will not be the case. In order to accommodate every caller at every level at which he or she wishes to call, we will get back to a hash tip followed by a singing call - perhaps 15 minutes exposure at any one level. This is hardly long enough for a caller to get used to the dancers and their capabilities and certainly not long enough for the new graduates to pecome accustomed to voice, tempo and sound.

This whole question was considered in some depth by the Activities Study Group and reported to the OSARDA Executive. If we are going to revert to the former format for Jamboree, I suggest that we go all the way back and make it just a graduation dance for the new dancers. After all, we now have a dancers' dance in the Fall Festival.

I would like to hear what some other dancers feel about this and I imagine OSARDA Executive would too. So take your pen in hand and drop the Editor a line.

ALBERTA SQUARE AND ROUND DANCE FEDERATION by Ray and Sylvia Lawson, Red Deer, Alberta

(Ray and Sylvia Lawson prepared this article for Square Time at Bob Pereira's request. Bob provided the preface. - Editor)

Preface

Square Time readers, many of whom are from the West, will find this story on the Alberta Federation interesting. Alberta had the first provincially incorporated federation, they gave us the first Canadian National Square and Round Dance Convention and they played a leading role in initiating and establishing played a leading role in initiating and establishing The Canadian Square and Round Dance Society which they incorporated federally. They are dynamic and friendly folks - dancers, callers and leaders, who seem to be achievement oriented.

The Alberta Square & Round Dance Federation was formed through efforts of members of the Wandering Squares, a group who have regular camp-outs four times a year. It was felt that the dancers in Alberta needed a governing body to offer direction for all dance activities and to help bond the areas together. The first meeting was held in Red Deer and resulted in the formation of a Provincial Federation in 1969. An annual convention has been held every year since, in Lethbridge, Edmonton, Calgary, Grand Prairie, Edmonton, Calgary, Red Deer and Lethbridge. We have our annual meeting every year in conjunction with the convention. We did not have a convention in 1978 due to the lst Canadian National in Edmonton, but we did have an annual meeting at the National. The 1979 convention will be held at Grimshaw in the northern part of the province and 1980 will be in Calgary.

Funds for our Federation come from our yearly conventions. Although all conventions are hosted by the area Associations, all proceeds are turned over to the Federation. There are no moneys paid to the host city or the callers for their work. Everyone, including the callers who take part in the program, pays a registration fee for the convention. For several years we have received a grant from our Provincial Government to assist in our efforts. The Alberta Square and Round Dance Federation is the only body who may receive grants from the Government. If any association or society requires funds, they must apply through the Federation so it can be put on their yearly budget when presented to the Government for a grant.

In 1973 Alberta was fortunate in having one of the two couples from Canada who attended Legacy in Cleveland, Ohio; the other couple was from Ontario. One caller couple from Alberta were charter members of Callerlab in 1974. Alberta was also instrumental in helping to form Roundalab in 1977. Alberta has the only Canadian couple on the board of directors of Roundalab - Jim and Marie Hopkins of Innisfail.

Through the efforts of our Federation we formed the Alberta Square and Round Dance Instructors Association in 1973, and now have more than 50 members.

The directors of our Federation include one dancer couple and one caller couple who are appointed from each of the seven zones in our province. They, in turn, elect the President, Secretary and other officers. The Secretary is the only officer who need not be an appointed zone representative. The President can hold office for only two consecutive years. The President and Secretary cannot both retire in the same year, thus keeping a certain amount of continuity on the board.

The Alberta Federation was the sponsor of the 1st Canadian National Convention held in Edmonton in 1978. In 1978 our Federation purchased a liability insurance policy for \$1,000,000 to cover all square and round dancers in Alberta at any square or round dance function, including our National Convention.

it has filed from Each year our Federation selects as many square dance rounds as possible and recommends that these be used throughout the province, if desired.

Our Alberta Instructors' Association holds a callers school once each year for prospective callers.

Our Federation makes yearly monetary donations to delegates who attend Legacy, Callerlab, Roundalab, and our Provincial Instructors' Association. Through the efforts of our Federation, the Canadian Square and Round Dance Society was formed in March of 1978 to assist all dancers in Canada and to assist with future Nationals. Much of the success of our Federation is due to the untiring efforts of the directors and secretary. Hopefully all provinces will form federations and so add to the stability and success of our Canadian Square and Round Dance Society.

QUALITIES FOR SUCCESSFUL LEADERSHIP

This article was forwarded to Square Time by Art Jackson. It is reprinted from the November, 1978 issue of "The Caller", Memphis, Tennessee. It was written by Charlie (Edith) Capon, Executive Secretary, ROUNDALAB, and Special Editorial Columnist for "The Caller". As this issue goes to press, we don't know whether elections will be required at the Annual Meeting to fill posts on the OSARDA Executive. If elections are required, the article seems especially relevant.

In the square and round dance movement we have two kinds of leaders: the amateur or short term leaders club and association officers and those who plan the many special events from club specials to the National Conventions, and career or long term leaders - S/D Callers and R/D Teachers. To succeed, every dance activity requires input from both kinds of leaders. It is this which gives us our strength. Through our system of co-operative leadership we are able to avoid many of the problems of autocratic leadership. The weaknesses of one leader is balanced by the strength of another on the The art of leadership cannot be taught, but those aspiring to leadership roles can learn if they are willing. The following are some qualities of successful leaders; none are strong in all, but all are strong in most.

WILLINGNESS TO SERVE - a leader should gladly accept the position he feels qualified for without any undue amount of ego, but with the humbleness of the realization that a great trust has been placed upon him or her.

ABILITY TO ORGANIZE - without a supportive organization of willing workers, the individual can accomplish little.

ABILITY TO DELEGATE RESPONSIBILITY the placing of others in positions of
trust for which the leader is responsible and appreciating their efforts
even if the leader believes he could
do better.

WILLINGNESS TO TRAIN OTHER LEADERS the leader who helps and trains others will have no problem in delegating responsibility and can be assured that the organization will continue to prosper when he leaves office.

PATIENCE to accomplish what is best for square and round dancing in spite of any obstruction.

UNDERSTANDING to recognize the problems of each dancer as well as all dancers.

INTEGRITY - people like to feel that their leader is a person who they can trust.

VISION - planning today for the organization of the future.

INITIATIVE - lethargy and procrastination are dominant human frailties which the leader must cast out forever from himself.

FORTITUDE is a lot of things - it is broad shoulders - it is thick skin and it is guts. It takes fortitude to withstand the petty jealousies of the "little" people. Fortitude is having the guts to take the lead in what you know to be right - regardless.

COMPETENCE - people are quick to detect the false leader who does not know his job.

JUST - we all respond to fairness.

HUMBLE - based on a recognition that fundamentally all human beings are shaped from the same mold.

WISE enough to be tolerant of the foibles of mankind and patient with individual eccentricities.

LOYALTY to the organization and to the people who make up the organization is an absolute necessity. There can be no question of his devotion to the organization and its principles. If the leader is to receive loyalty from his followers, he must make it a part of his life blood to be always loyal to them.

SEWING HINT

Are you afraid the dye might run on a piece of material (or a garment) you're anxious to buy? Well, if you go ahead anyway, there are two ways to set the dye so that it won't run.

- A) Using salt:
 Rinse the article in cold water.
 Fill a dishpan with cold water
 to just cover the article.
 Dissolve 2 tablespoons of
 salt in water and replace article.
 Soak approximately two hours.
 Rinse again in clear water.
 Colour is set.
- B) Using vinegar:
 Soak the article in a solution of l cup of vinegar to l quart of water for several hours. Rinse and wash as usual before you use.
 Dye is now set.

(Glen Maynard) - by Bob & Betty Bell


Many thanks to Bob Cathcart who visited our club as guest caller in early January. It was a fun evening of dancing.

tions involving the various activities that are described below.

Special Guest Sub-Committee. Under the chairmanship of Ron Iles this sub-committee is diarged with the responsibility of looking after the invitations to be extended, to welcome and attend to the special needs of the guests, to coordinate and man a special guest room and act as the contact point for all dealings with dignitaries, their security and comfort.

Souvenirs Sub-Committee. Abe Zenel is chairing this sub-committee and will be assembling various items suitable as mementos of the 2nd National.

Tour Group Information. We are already receiving inquiries from tour groups in Japan, Europe and Australia and Kay Christie is looking after the correspondence with these dance groups.

These are certain to be exciting mements. We can't release the details as yet but Bob Shaw is chairman of this sub-committee and we believe you will be pleased with the plans of this group.

Colour Scheme Sub-Committee.

Due to the almost 100% adoption by the Alberta dancers in selecting and

FROM THE EDITORS DESK

A continuing turnover in Club Executives (not to mention Square Time staff!), can result in a lack of awareness of Square Time policies. We feel that club contacts should be particularly aware of the following:

The <u>Club Chatter</u> guidelines are part of the current Square Time guidelines adopted by the OSARDA Executive in September, 1977.

- 1) Club chatter entries must be submitted in writing (typed if possible) by the deadline date as published in Square Time. A maximum of 130 words per entry will be accepted.
- 2) Special events should be mentioned only once either before or after the event not both.
- 3) Long references to food (unless a club has something unique) should be omitted.
- 4) News should be of interest to all dancers not just to the members of the individual club.
- 5) Reference to a club event involving payment by other than members of that club shall be considered as advertising and shall be deleted from Club Chatter.

We hope that clubs submitting material will try to keep that material consistent with the guidelines. As editors, we want to stress guideline 4 -- that news should be of interest to all dancers. Please don't feel obliged to submit something for Club Chatter every month or two. We would prefer to see clubs submit material on the basis that they have news for others, without worrying about how long it has been since the club's last submission.

Advertisements for dance events should be cleared with the OSARDA Secretary prior to a request for publication. In any event, a dance date should be cleared with the Secretary before it is finalized -- if this is done, conflicts of date can be minimized.
